

Water Rents and Property Taxes Must Be Paid At Once

Notice To All Whom It May Concern:

By order of the Board of Aldermen of the town of Brevard, N. C., this is to notify each and every person, firm or corporation within the corporate limits of the town of Brevard, N. C., that on the 15th day of February, 1917, if all back water rents are not paid—which includes water rent due on the 1st day of January, 1917—that the town Marshall is instructed to and will cut off all water from each dwelling, store-house, and all other property which is supplied with water from the water supply of said town.

It is further ordered by the Board of Aldermen of said town of Brevard, N. C., that all taxes, whether on property or street paving assessment or side-walk assessment, that are now due—this includes taxes due for 1916—be collected at once, and this is to notify all persons and property owners within the corporate limits of said town that the undersigned will be in the office of Mayor of said town each day, Sunday excepted, from the hours of one to four o'clock p. m. to receive and receipt for all water rent and taxes. This is the last public notice that will be given, and settlement must be made as herein called for, otherwise the laws and ordinances regulating the collection of water rents and taxes will be strictly enforced.

SCHOOL BOND ELECTION CALLED FOR DISTRICT NO 3, BOYD TOWNSHIP

Notice: All persons are hereby notified that the Commissioners of Transylvania county did on Monday February 5th, 1917, in regular meeting upon request of the County Board of Education, order an election to be held in school district No. 3, Boyd township, said election to be held at the school house in said district on Tuesday, March 13, 1917.

Said election being called and held for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the voters of said school district, as to whether or not said district shall issue bonds in the sum of \$1,000.00, said bonds to run for a period of twenty years and draw interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, interest due and payable semi annually.

All electors in said district will take notice that a new registration of the voters of said district has been ordered and that T. W. Middleton has been appointed registrar and A. C. Lyday and C. W. Talley judges of said bond election and that the books for registration will open on Saturday, February 10th, 1917.

The purpose of the bonds to be issued is to help to pay the expenses of building and suitably equipping a school house for Penrose high school.

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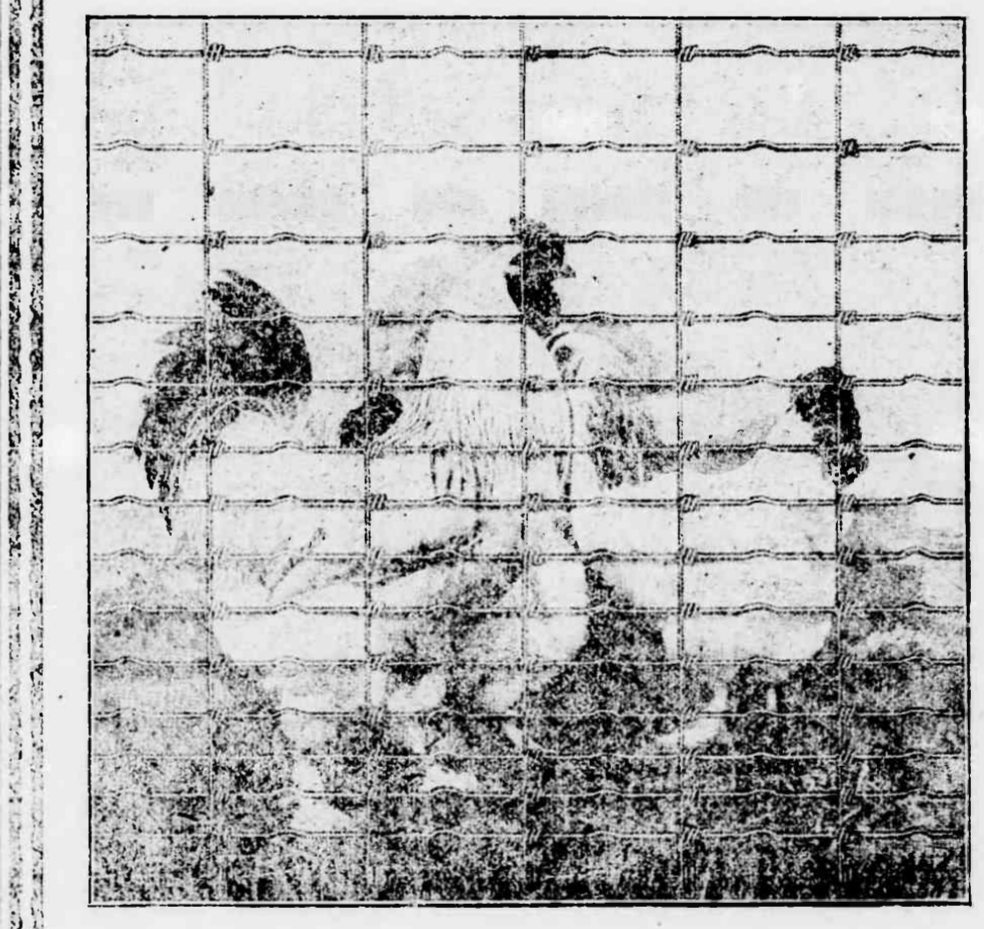
QUESTIONS ON COMMUNITY CIVICS BY THE TEACHERS
