BLUE SUNDAY FOR BREVARD ADVOCATED; COST OF SIN

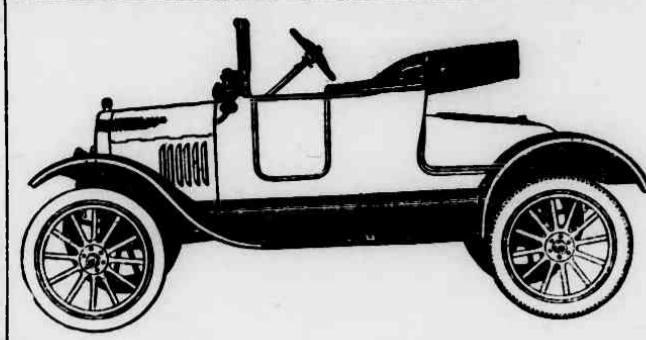

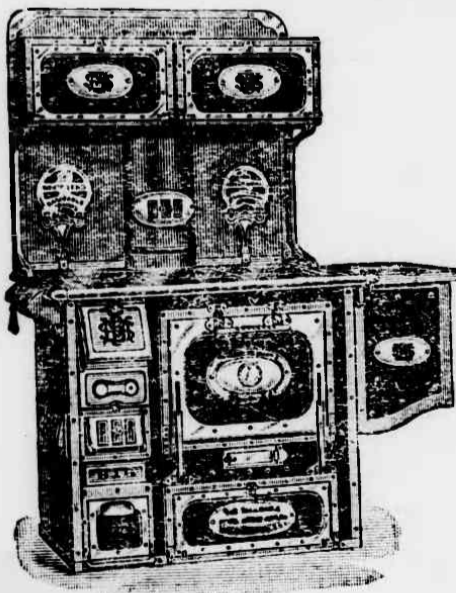
