Mr. Zachary came into possession of this property about three years ago and during this time has been with maple sugar and butter or with improving it. He gives his orchard milk or cream. and farm scientific attention and now has fruit kept over from last summer. He sprays his orchard, which is in good shape and which grows choice wormless fruits.

PROGRESS MADE ON TANNERY BUILDINGS

M. Dworetzky, of New York, president of the Toxaway Tanning company of Rosman and vice president of the Transylvania Tanning company of Brevard, the plant of the latter now being under con struction, spent a few days in Brevard and Rosman during the past week with his son, Nathan Dworstzky, at Rosman, meanwhile conferring with Jos. S. Silverstein, manager of these plants.

Mr. Dworetzky found that despite unfavorable weather conditions considerable progress had been made with the building operations for the plant in Breyard. The frame work of the beam house or main building, 70x683 feet with concrete foundation, is going up as well as the bark-shed and the foundation, for a 150-foot brick smokestack has been laid. The office building will probably be finished within the next ten days.
