## SCHOOL BOND ELECTION CALLED FOR DISTRICT NO 3, BOYD TOWNSHIP

NOTICE: All persons are hereby notified that the Commissioners of Transylvania County upon a petition of the County Board of Education, have ordered an election to be held in District No. 3, Boyd Township, Transylvania County on April 17, 1917, at the School House in said District. Said Election is ordered for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the voters in said District, as to whether or not the County Commissioners shall issue and float Bonds in the sum of \$1,600.00 for a period not exceeding 20 years and to draw interest at six per cent, payable semi-annually to raise money to build and equip a new School House in said District.

## THE WEEK'S EVENTS

Important News of the State, Nation, and World Told in a Few Lines for Your Convenience.

### ROUND ABOUT THE WORLD

A Condensed Record of Happenings of Interest From All Points of the World.

**Domestic**  
The railroad strike which has hung like a pall of gloom over the country for many months has been averted. This carried joy to the remotest corner of the country.  
The conference committee of railroad managers sitting in New York City authorized President Wilson's mediators to make whatever arrangements were necessary with the railroad brotherhoods to call off the threatened strike.  
The decision in the railroad strike situation means that the brotherhoods have won an important victory, but it does not bring them all their original demands. By the agreement they will be awarded pro rata time for overtime on the basis of an eight-hour day which they have been assured. Their original demands called for time and a half for overtime on the same basic day.

The adjutant general's office of the state of North Carolina announces receipt of an order suspending the instructions for the muster out of the Second and Third North Carolina regiments of the National Guard and brigade headquarters, and directing that they be held under arms after arrival here from the border.  
Maj. Cassius E. Gillett, U. S. A., retired, who took a prominent part in the Greene-Gaynor scandal in Savannah twenty years ago, died at his home in Philadelphia. He retired from the navy in 1905 to become head of the Philadelphia filtration bureau.  
Classic Boston was thrown in a frenzy of excitement when a bomb exploded in the Suffolk county court house, killing two men and injuring another. One of the dead was Louis A. Zollinger, a janitor employed in the building. The other, unidentified, was believed by the police to have been the bearer of the explosive.  
The object of the Boston bomb carrier will probably never be ascertained, but the fact that Judge Loring's session of court was only 25 feet from the anteroom in which the explosion occurred indicates to the authorities that this might possibly have been successful had not the bomb exploded prematurely.  
When the bomb exploded in the Boston court house girl stenographers fainted, a jury that was locked up for deliberation in a room overhead clattered for release and a court officer collapsed. But for the seriousness of the dilemma, it was almost laughable. Order was quickly restored, and strong guards were placed over both the court house and the nearby state house.

The war revenue act prescribing a special annual tax upon bankers of one dollar for every one thousand dollars of capital used or employed by them, declared unconstitutional by Federal Judge Hough in New York, has been upheld by the United States circuit court of appeals.  
The new tariff commission named by President Wilson is composed as follows: Prof. Frank W. Taussig of Harvard university; former Representative David J. Lewis of Cumberland, Md.; former Representative William Kent of Kentfield, Cal.; Daniel C. Roper of McColl, S. C.; E. P. Costigan of Denver, and W. S. Culbertson of Emporia, Kans.

Acting on rumors of a plot to dynamite the billion-gallon reservoir at Beenton, N. J., hard by which are located many large ammunition plants, the governor was called upon to provide a military guard for the works. Meantime, thirty policemen, all of whom have served in the regular army, supplied with rifles and ammunition, are guarding the reservoir.

**Washington**  
The sinking of the American steamships City of Memphis, Illinois and Vigilancia is announced. Fourteen men from the Valencia are missing as are some of the men from the City of Memphis. The crew of the Illinois was landed safely.  
A dispatch from Juarez, Mexico, says Villa holds Parral, Jimenez, and all of the country in southwestern Chihuahua. Separate efforts are being concentrated to repel the advance of the Villa forces.  
China's action in breaking diplomatic relations with Germany is expected to have far-reaching effect on far eastern history, as it formally aligns China with Japan and other triple entente powers.  
China has severed diplomatic relations with Germany, and the German ambassador has been handed his passport. The immediate effect of China's severance of relations probably will be a greatly increased output of munitions for Russia, in which line China is the king of the world.  
China has already sent one hundred thousand coolies to France and Russia and can increase the number almost without limit.  
Complete and definite instructions to the "armed guards" to be placed aboard American merchant craft to go through the German submarine zones have been completed by the navy department and approved by Secretary Lansing.

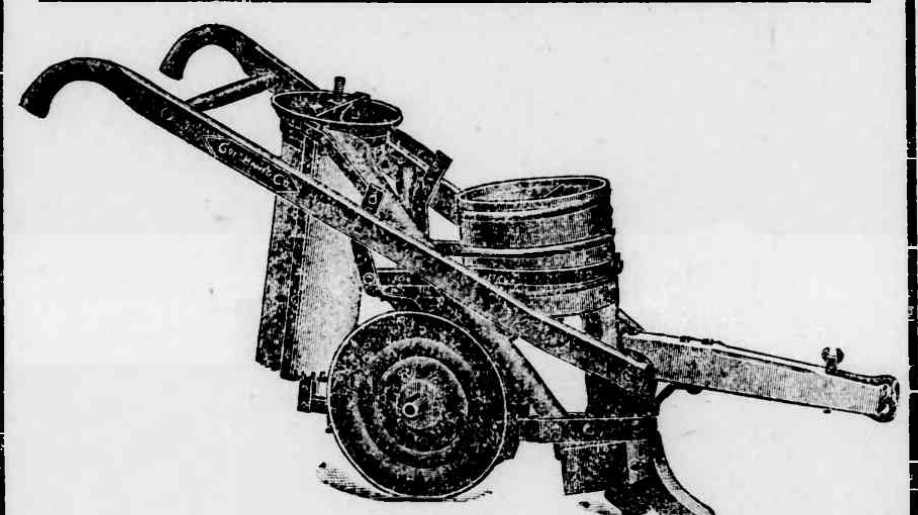

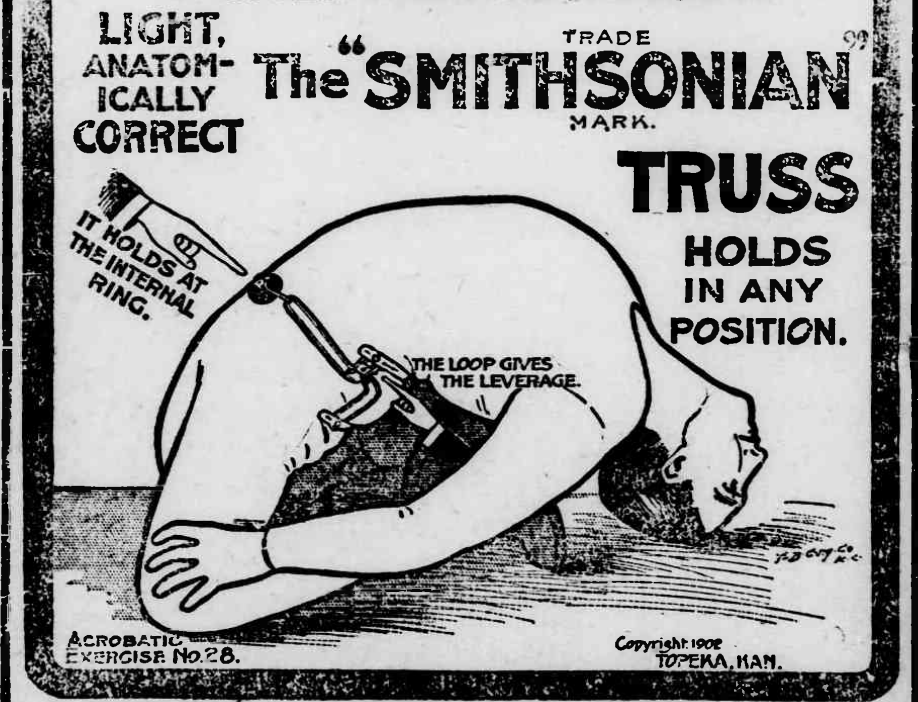
