English, as chairman, and the members of the Betterment gave a rising vote of thanks to Mr. Cooke, the mayor; Mr. Brooks, the policeman; Mr. Hollowell, editor of the Brevard News, and Mr. Price, who painted the street signs, and all others who have given so much assistance in cleaning up the town.

The Flower committee, who are endeavoring to help make Brevard beautiful, told of the distribution of seeds and bulbs, Mrs. David Ward making the report of that and other efforts on the part of the committee. Another rising vote of thanks was given to Col. Hodges, who has promised to beautify the vacant lots near the depot.

The association passed a motion to meet soon and plant flowers on the school grounds.

The United Daughters of the Confederacy kindly offered the use of its building for making hospital supplies and learning "first aid" work, as the members wish to cooperate with the Betterment in its intended work along this line. Their offer is much appreciated.

A campaign to fight the fly nuisance will be begun in co-operation with the Brevard News.

A suggestion was made that the Betterment and all other organizations in the town—religious, civic and social—should combine resources to build and equip a rest room for farmers' wives. This question was left open for future discussion.

County jail has been visited by a committee and found that the prisoners have no chairs to sit on, bed cover is very scarce for cold weather otherwise in very good condition.

We have examined and passed all bills presented to us by the Solicitor.

We commend his Honor Henry T. Lane Judge presiding, for his able charge and instructions to the Grand Jury. Also Solicitor Michael Schenck for his courteous and gentlemanly consideration and his diligence in performing his duties. Respectfully submitted.
