The announcement of the Cascade Power company that it is proceeding with the fuller development of its plant on Little River is good news to this section and especially to Brevard and Pisgah Forest. We admire the stand taken by Editor Sentelle, who also occupies a chair as town alderman, in giving full publicity to the trouble with the view to educating the public of conditions and stamping out the epidemic. Attempts to smother such trouble as that comes very costly in the long run.

Editor Bush of the Tryon News-Bee has found time to make some calculations. He concludes that he received requests in one mail asking for free space to the amount of 140 columns. We haven't found time to go into details but since the war started we have been besieged by similar requests from all kinds of organizations. We are prompted to agitate the organization of a "Society for the Prevention of Foolish Activity," for it has reached an alarming stage.

COMPLETE RETURNS SHOW THAT STATE REGISTERED MORE THAN ESTIMATED.

Raleigh.—With complete returns from all the counties as to the official figures in the registration for the selective army draft, the returns show gains over the government estimate, which was 187,930. The complete returns show a total registration of 200,032.
