The following wedding announcement has been received at this office:

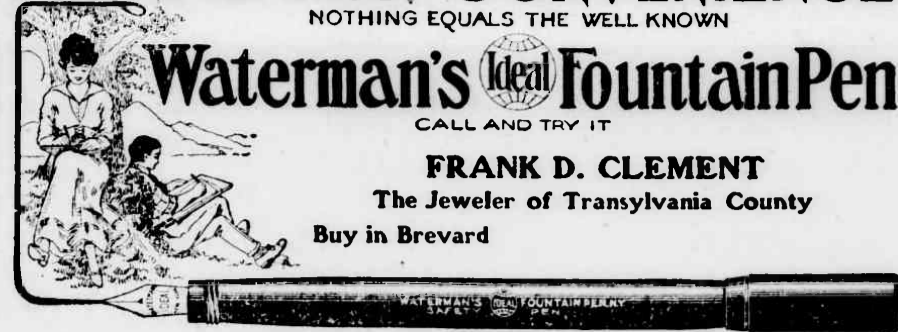
Mr. and Mrs. George W. Bishop announce the marriage of their daughter Dora Elizabeth

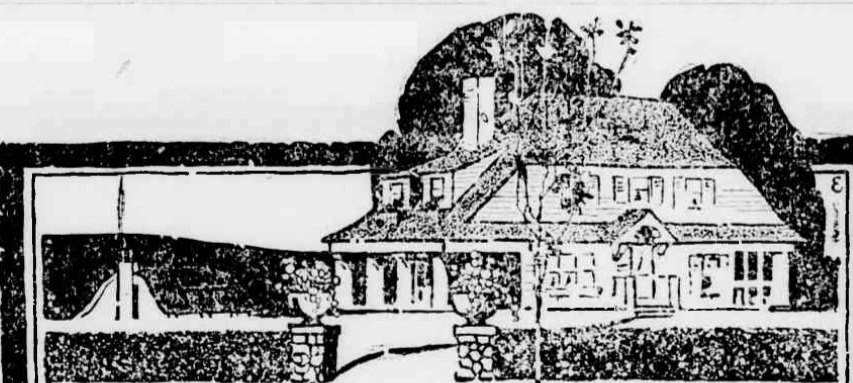
