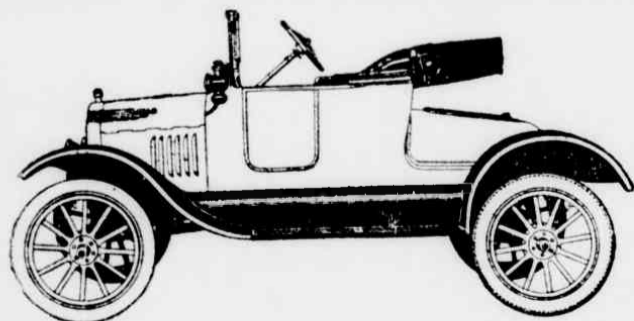
Classes are being conducted at the Institute at 2:30 and at the Graded School at 4 o'clock every day in the week except Saturday. New members may enter the classes any time.
