PROF. HENDERSON WRITES OF EDUCATIONAL WORK

Reviews His Work As Superintendent and Looks Forward to Educational Growth.

Editor, News:

When the county board of education selected me to the office of county superintendent of schools in the summer of 1905, I understood something of the great task to which I had been called, realizing that the superintendent's office is the central office of the school system, up to which and down from which authority, direction and inspiration flow. I realized also that the superintendent must be the organizer and director of the work of the schools in all of their different phases, and the representative of the schools and all for which the schools stand before the people of the county; that he is the executive officer of the board of education, and must also be the leader, adviser and friend of the teachers. Yet amid all these varied duties and responsibilities, it was evident that the larger educational interests of the county as a whole must be constantly kept in mind, and that my chief care must be the interests of the children in the schools.

At the time I began the work of superintending the schools of the county the office paid less than \$21.00 a month, so in accepting the position there was nothing to be considered except the interests of the boys and girls of the county. That, to be sure, was sufficient consideration, and for the past twelve years all my time, means and efforts have been directed toward the improvement of the county's educational system, that our future citizens might have an opportunity to receive such training as our public schools ought to give. As is well known, the progress of the work was very much retarded by obstacles and opposition which were met along the way.

Yet, notwithstanding opposition from certain sources, a great deal has been accomplished in the way of general educational improvement, as was evidenced in the Brevard News of June 29. This marked progress is due to no one man or set of men. It can be truthfully stated that it has been due, principally, to the earnest, progressive and sacrificing efforts of the county superintendent, the persistent and fearless administration of the boards of education, the worthy ideals and cooperative efforts of the school committees, the earnest desire for improvement on the part of parents and their willingness to co-operate in helping to bring about better educational conditions for their children, and the noble and heroic service of the earnest and faithful teachers in the schools.

While the progress that we have made is very marked indeed, yet it is only the beginning of the improvements that ought to be undertaken and accomplished in the next few years. When we compare our schools of today with what they were twelve years ago, we are gratified at the great contrast; but by comparing what they are today with what they ought to be we realize that what has been accomplished is only a foundation, and that upon this foundation may be erected an everlasting educational structure, if those who have charge of the county's public educational work fully realize the great task that lies before them.

The county superintendent who has been selected to succeed me is a man of ability, energy and enthusiasm. He is a man who believes in local school taxes for longer and better schools and in bond issues for the building and equipping of school houses where the funds cannot be otherwise provided. I wish for him and his work that degree of success which ought to accompany his administration.

In bidding good-bye to the office of county superintendent of schools it is my desire that the members of the boards of education with whom I have served, the various school committees, the parents and the teachers accept this expression of my deepest gratitude for the co-operation they have given in school work, and to the three thousand school boys and girls of the county I wish to express my heartfelt devotion and my earnest good wishes for a glorious future. 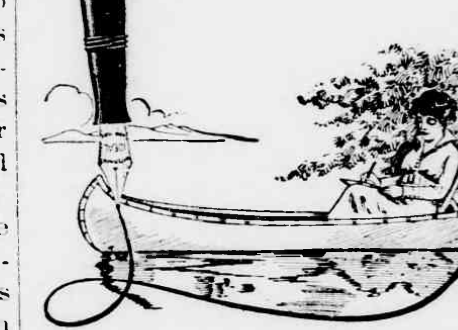
