### BREVARD HARDWARE COMPANY GETS PAGE OF PUBLICITY

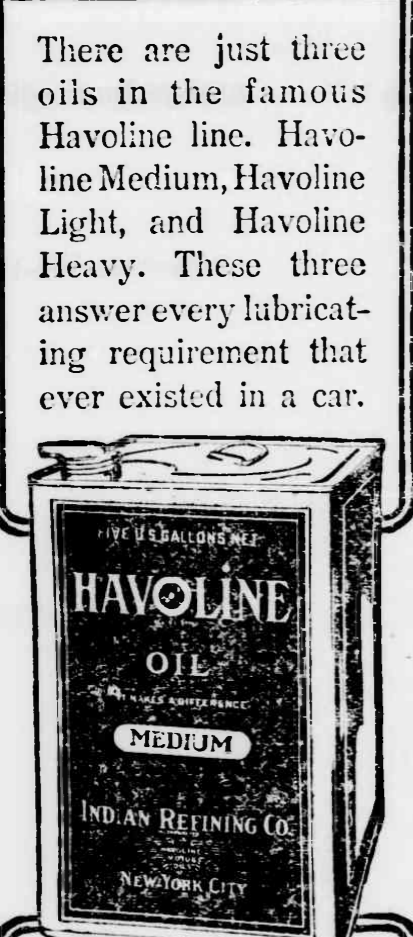
