The pathos of this gradual failure was presented forcibly, but the brightside of the picture was also shown in the stream of spiritual life, which begins here and flows on in eternity—the stream that does not fail.

Music appropriate to the occasion was given prominently. M. J. Orr, H. C. Gillespie, F. S. Starrette and J. M. Orr sang old time songs and showed the young degenerates what former generations had done and could still do. It was evident that their voices were streams that had not yet failed.

REVIVAL SERVICES AT DAVIDSON RIVER

Meeting which began last week continues—Much interest is shown—Strong preaching by Rev. T. E. Simpson—All-day service next Sunday.

A series of meetings began last Friday at Davidson River Presbyterian Church and has been continuing this week. The pastor, Rev. John R. Hay, being assisted by Rev. T. E. Simpson, of Hendersonville, and Rev. W. P. Chedester.

Mr. Simpson arrived on Monday and has been preaching every night since to large congregations. His sermons are impressive and the attendance of men is especially noticeable. A service for men was held on Thursday night.

The meetings will continue until Sunday night, services being held at 10:30 in the morning and 7:30 in the evening, except on Sunday morning, when they will begin at 11.

Sunday is Davidson River Day, a time devoted to all-day attendance, preaching and communion in the morning, dinner on the grounds, and preaching in the afternoon and at night.
