There are sixteen institutions for homeless children in the State and yet there are hundreds of children who each recurring year knock in vain for admission to these homes—because they lack the means to accommodate more than they are caring for at the present time.

Unless we are particularly active and generous this year the usual Thanksgiving Day offering will fall short—because so many appear to think they are not "able" to do as much as usual on account of the war's demands, etc. To guard against this peril for it is a peril to the continued welfare of the orphans now in the various homes, let us determine TODAY that we will be more liberal than formerly and thereby even up the shortcomings of others. One day's income is the standard gift that should be freely given by the great majority of men and by thousands of good women.

Charity begins at home—in the orphan's home, where your own blood are provided for—against actual suffering—for this is the greatest of all our charities, with which no other should be allowed to interfere. We should be glad to help all we can and everywhere it is possible to do so. But never let it be said of North Carolinians that they neglected this, their greatest of charities. 
