J. D. Smith has sold his home here to R. A. Owen.

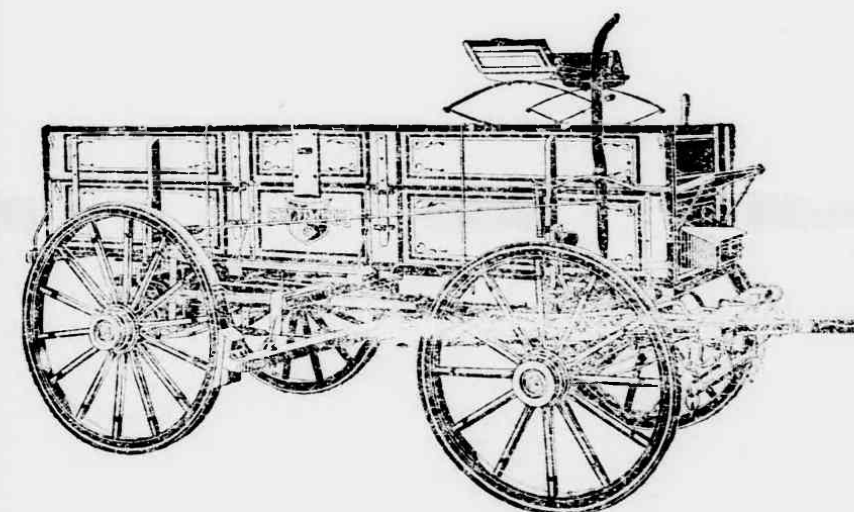
