Under and by virtue of the power of sale contained in that certain deed of trust, recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds for Transylvania County, North Carolina, in Book 11, page 3, executed on August 18th, 1916, by W. D. Parrish and his wife, T. C. Gower and his wife, and Fred W. Symmes to W. E. Beattie, as Trustee, to secure the indebtedness therein described, and default having been made in the payment of interest on the note secured by said deed of trust and upon demand of the owners and holders of said note, the undersigned Trustee will offer for sale on Monday, December 31, 1917, at 12 o'clock noon, at the door of the court house of Brevard, Transylvania County, North Carolina, to the highest bidder for cash:

All those certain tracts of land with the buildings thereon and the furniture and fixtures therein contained, to-wit: All those tracts lying in the town of Brevard, County of Transylvania, State of North Carolina, and known as Franklin Hotel property, and consisting of the following tracts:

First tract: Beginning at a stake on the north margin of Main street at the point of intersection of north margin of said Main street with the east margin of Rice street, and runs with the north margin of Main street south 61 degrees and 15 minutes east about four hundred (400) feet to a stake at the point where the north margin of Main street intersects with the west margin of Franklin street; thence with the west margin of Franklin street north 56 degrees 15 minutes east two hundred and sixty-two and six tenths (262.6) feet to the point where the west margin of Smith's drive, as laid down on a plat of the Franklin Park lanes, made by H. G. Bailey and A. L. Hardin, engineers; thence with the south margin of Smith's drive as laid down on said plat as above mentioned to a point where the south margin of said drive intersects to east margin of Rice street; thence south 28 degrees and 45 minutes west with the east margin of Rice street two hundred and seventy-five (275) feet, more or less, to the point of beginning, containing three (3) acres, more or less, embracing the plat of ground on which the Franklin Hotel is located.

Second tract: Adjoining the above tract and lying to the north and east of same. Beginning on a stake at the north end of Rice street at the intersection of the north margin of a twenty-foot alley with the northwest margin of said Smith's drive as laid down on said plat above mentioned, and runs north 28 degrees and 45 minutes east three hundred and fifty (350) feet to a stake in the north boundary line of the property formerly belonging to the Franklin Park Improvement Company; then with the said north boundary line South 78 degrees and 52 minutes east, nine hundred and fifteen (915) feet to a stake on the west margin of an alley-way opposite a post oak corner; thence with the west margin of said alley-way the following courses and distances: South 39 degrees west one hundred and ten (110) feet to a stake; thence south 58 degrees and 9 minutes west five hundred (500) feet, more or less, to the north margin of Smith's drive as laid down on said plat above mentioned; thence with the north margin of said Smith's drive about four hundred (400) feet to the point of beginning, containing about five acres, and embracing the tract known as the Franklin Hotel Garden.

Third tract: Embracing what was known as the Franklin Lake site. Beginning on a stake on the North margin of Lake View Avenue, the southwest corner of Lot No. 25 as laid down on the plat above referred to, at a point two hundred and twenty-one and eight-tenths (221.8) feet from where the north margin of said Lake View Avenue intersects with the east margin of Franklin Street, about opposite the northeast corner of the Woodbridge property, and runs with the west margin of what is designated on said plat above mentioned as Franklin Park, north 60 degrees and 32 minutes east four hundred and sixty-four and four-tenths (464.4) feet to a stake, corner of lot 37 as laid down on said plat; thence north 67 degrees east two hundred and six and four-tenths (206.4) feet to a stake in the south margin of Lake View Avenue, then with the south margin of Lake View Avenue, crossing the dam of said Franklin lake site, south 51 degrees east about two hundred and twenty-five (225) feet to a turn in said Lake View Ave, then still with the margin of said Lake View Ave, south 34 deg. and 10 minutes west about two hundred and fifty (250) feet to another turn in said Ave; then still with the margin of said Lake View Avenue the following courses and distances: south 3 degrees and 23 minutes west about one hundred and twenty (120) feet to a stake; then south 43 degrees and 53 minutes west about seventy-five (75) feet to a stake; thence south 52 degrees and 10 minutes west about three hundred (300) feet to a stake; then still with the north margin of said Lake View Avenue

as it is laid down and represented on the plat above mentioned, about five hundred (500) feet more or less, to the beginning, containing six acres, more or less.

ONE ACRE ORCHARD FOR MOUNTAIN SECTION

B. W. Hatt, state horticulturist, has recently gotten out a plan for an ideal home orchard and a list of fruit trees and vines adapted to the mountain section of North Carolina. Every farmer who

hasn't a good orchard should plan to put out a few trees this winter. Grapes is a fruit that no farm should be without.

The following list of trees and vines can be planted on one acre of land and will cost \$25.00:

Apple Trees—Summer varieties: Yellow Transparent, Early Harvest, Red Astrachan, Red June. Autumn varieties: Wealthy, Bonum, Buckingham, Delicious, Grimes, Mother, Virginia Beauty, Winter

varieties: Mammoth Black Twine, Rome Beauty, Stayman, York Imperial, Winesap, Plum Trees—Red June. Abundance, Climax, Danson.

Grapes—Delaware, Lurie, Brighton, Lindley, Niagara, Concord, Catawba

Peach Trees—Early varieties: Mayflower, Greensboro, Triumph. Hedges in varieties: Carman, Hiley, Georgia Belle. Late varieties: Chinese Cling, Elberta, Eaton, Salway, Stinson. Cherries (sour)—Early Richmond, Montmorency, Morella. Sweet Cherries: Wood,

Black Tartarian, Spanish, Windsor. Blackberries—Early Harvest. Raspberries—Lucretia. Raspberries—Culbert. Currants—Fay, White Grape, Pomona. Gooseberries—Houghton, Downing.
