Staggering Blow to Great Evil.

Liquor has long been recognized as the greatest enemy of society and the home, but it is altogether likely that the traffic will be only a memory in the course of a few years.

In the message by the Senate the resolution provided for a national prohibition which would be in force in any state or territory of the American Union.

Thirty-one states will have to ratify the amendment of the constitution and become a part of the prohibition.

Twenty-seven of the prohibition states are already in the dry column and the temporary prohibition are relying upon each of these to take favorable action in the resolution as soon as the next legislative convene.

The prospects for ratification by many near-dry states like Ohio, Missouri, Texas and Wyoming is extremely encouraging to the dry cause, but the advocates of the amendment fully realize that a tremendous struggle is ahead of them to secure the necessary thirty-six.

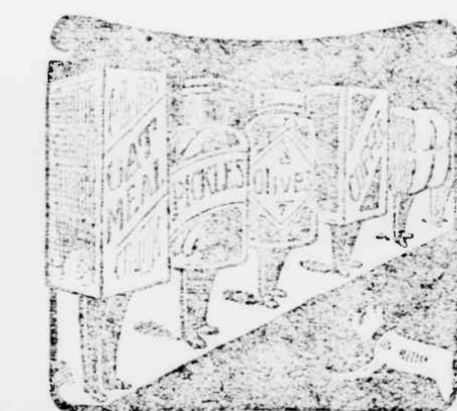
