## PETITION COMMISSIONERS FOR BOND ELECTION

The school board asks the county commissioners to call an election for Brevard township to ascertain the will of the people as to issuing bonds for the erection of a suitable school building. The petition follows and seems very fair; read it carefully:

Board of County Commissioners, Transylvania County, Brevard, N. C.

Gentlemen: We, the undersigned members of the County Board of Education, respectfully petition your honorable body to call an election for Brevard township, district No. 1, to ascertain the will of the people on the question of issuing bonds under the "State-wide Bond Act for School Buildings," the amount of the bond issue to be and not to exceed \$25,000 (twenty-five thousand dollars), the rate of interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and the length of the time the bond is to run shall not exceed twenty years, and the maximum tax that may be levied shall not exceed thirty cents on the one hundred dollars property and ninety cents on the poll.

## CHEESE FACTORY TO BE LOCATED AT PENROSE

County Agent R. E. Lawrence has succeeded in organizing a stock company at Penrose, the purpose of which is the manufacture of cheese. The factory will have a capacity of 500 pounds of cheese per day, 500 gallons of milk being required to produce this amount of cheese.

Mr. Lawrence states that this will beat making butter, as it takes three gallons of milk for one pound of butter and only one gallon for a pound of cheese. The butter sells at 40 cents a pound and the cheese at 29 cents. Out of three gallons of milk made into butter one gets 40 cents; out of the same number of gallons made into cheese he gets 81 cents—a little more than double.

All parties who have taken shares in this factory are requested to meet at Penrose Saturday at 2 p. m., for the purpose of electing officers and board of directors.
