The British have been making steady advances. British aviators have made a brilliant record by their astounding fearing and skill.

French and Americans have wiped out the St. Mihiel salient and opened the way for a direct invasion of German territory by the Allies.

Many thousands of Cermans and Austrians have been trapped in the territory between Vigneulles and St. Mihiel.

Americans have captured many guns. One division alone took 43 cannon.

Secretary of War Baker witnessed part of the battle of St. Mihiel and said that the Americans fought like veterans. He said that the spirit and courage of the Americans was most inspiring.

In Macedonia the Serbian and French troops have advanced more than five miles.






