YOUR HEALTH

Influenza caused more deaths in the United States than war among our soldiers—83,306 deaths.

In October more than five thousand people in North Carolina died of influenza or influenza-pneumonia.

The problem of prevention is one that lies in the hands of the individual for solution. Influenza is a crowd disease. It is spread by "spit swapping" through the means of the unmuzzled cough and sneeze, or the use of drinking cups, eating utensils or towels that have been used by an infected person. The prevention of the disease depends upon each individual avoiding crowds where infection is so easy, and refusing to use the things that some one else has used. The responsibility for preventing the spread of the disease rests with the individual directly.

Our County Board of Health has done and is doing a great work in preventing the spread of the disease. If the people will follow its rules, I feel certain that much sickness will be prevented and many lives saved in the future as has been done in the past and when the final count of the ravages of this disease is taken, Transylvania will show as a banner county in its prevention.

Remember that the health authorities are unselfishly doing all that is possible to prevent the spread of the disease; they are acting from a sense of duty in all that they do. Will not every man, woman and child help by following all directions for the prevention of this disease?

Please remember that we may soon face other diseases and may the success of your health authorities in checking this influenza show all the great wisdom and vital necessity of reporting all contagious diseases, at once, so that their spread can be prevented—smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, whooping cough, measles, in short, report all "catching" diseases, thereby protecting your family and community.
