DEATH OF MRS. ELIZABETH GILLESPIE.

Mrs. Elizabeth Gillespie died at her home near Rosman, Feb. 26. She was 87 years old July 1, 1918. Had been sick for about one year. She joined the Baptist church while young and has been a consistent member ever since. Her membership being with the Mt. Moriah Baptist Church at the time of her death. Her maiden name was Lynch. She was the last of sixteen children of her father's family to die. Although some were younger than she. Mrs. Gillespie was born and raised in Pickens county, S. C. until the age of eighteen. She married Jason Gillespie and came to Transylvania County, where they lived happily together. Her husband fought in the Civil war. During his absence their house was burned.

He died during the year of 1888. She leaves eight children.

The children were all present at the funeral except Mrs. Malinda Aiken. The remains were laid to rest in the family cemetery on her place.
