IN MEMORY OF MRS. ELIZABETH GILLESPIE

Who Answered the Summons of Her Redeemer on February 27, 1919 And Went to Her Reward

Mrs. Gillespie's maiden name was Lynch, she was born and reared in Pickens county, S. C. She was born July 1st, 1832, was married to Jason R. Gillespie Jan. 18, 1850; to this union was born eleven children, five boys and six girls and all lived to be grown, married and reared families,

except one, which died in infancy. Two of the girls, Mrs. Craven Galloway and Mrs. Erwin A. Glazner, went to their reward some 10 or 12 years ago and were waiting for their dear old mother.

Mrs. Gillespie professed faith in Christ and joined the East Fork Baptist Church in 1852 under the ministry of Rev. Joe Blythe and has been a faithful member of the Baptist Church ever since. About twenty years ago she moved her membership to Mt. Moriah near Calvert, N. C. and remained there until her death. She leaves behind her to mourn their loss four sons and four daughters: J. L. and W. N. Gillespie, Rosman; A. H. Gillespie, Calvert, N. C.; C. P. Gillespie, Mrs. Jessie W. Allison and Mrs. Linda Aiken of Pickens, S. C.; Mrs. W. P. Southern, Taylors, S. C. and fifty two grand children, all her children professed faith in Christ and were and are active church members.

Mr. and Mrs. Gillespie after their marriage lived near Quebec awhile, then settled near Rosman, where they made their homes until death claimed them. Mr. Gillespie died some thirty years ago. After all the children were married off, her son J. L. Gillespie moved in the house with her and took care of her until she was called to a better home above.

Mrs. Gillespie was blessed with good health and was exceedingly strong for a lady of her age. Up until about a year before her death she could do a good deal of light work, was always industrious, was kind and loving to her neighbors, was loved by all who knew her. The writer doubts if she had an enemy in the world. Mrs. Gillespie always visited the sick and administered to their needs in every way possible, but for the last few months she was very feeble. A few days before she died, her children were summoned and all came except one, most of them arriving the evening before she died, she recognized all of them.

Just a little while before she died she called to some of her friends and kin folks who had gone on before and said she could see them, then she told Jesus to reach both hands and lead her across to the other shore, said she was happy to leave this troublesome world.

In her death Transylvania has lost one of its best women, and the community lost a good neighbor and friend. She will be greatly missed.
