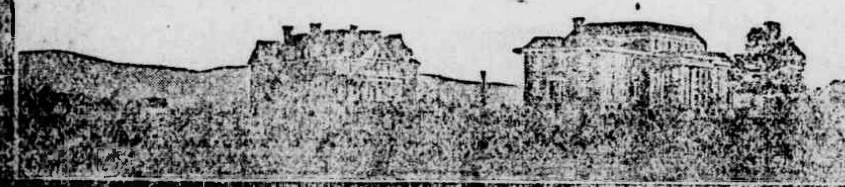

POULTRY POINTS

II.—THOROUGHBREDS

The days of "Old Dominecker" are numbered, just as are the days of the Razorback and "Old Mooley." They are very good of their kind, but their kind are just common scrubs. And the scrub can't pay for its keep at the present high price of feed, whether it be a cow, hog or hen.

First, it pays to keep thoroughbred poultry. True, it costs more to get a start with them, if you start with the right breed and strain, they will soon pay back this extra cost, and then it will cost no more to keep a flock of thoroughbreds than it will the same number of scrubs.

Second, it pays to sell thoroughbred poultry and its products. True, the market price of common eggs went to fifty cents per dozen in mid-winter, but that was because common eggs were not being laid by very many common hens, but my thoroughbred flock were averaging 75 per cent. Still I didn't sell an egg at the top of the market, because I could get three or four times the top market price for eggs for hatching purposes. True also, that common five-months-old cockerels brought \$1.00 apiece as broilers, but I had more calls than I could supply for thoroughbred cockerels of the same age at \$5.00.

Third, it is impossible to improve thoroughbreds. By culling the eggs, the young birds that are irregular, and the pullets that are undersized or poor layers, and especially by getting a new male that is unrelated to the females about every two years, the breed can be kept up to standard and the strain can be improved. For thoroughbreds will degenerate, and a degenerated thoroughbred is no better than a scrub. In line with my usual policy I have this week put a \$10 setting of eggs under a hen from which I expect to hatch a male for my flock of golden beauties next season.

Fourth, thoroughbreds can be exhibited in the Fair of Poultry Show. It is to encourage boys and girls to begin breeding them that I have given a prize for two successive seasons for the best pair of thoroughbreds of any breed. This year I shall give a pair of young birds from my flock for the best pair of Buff Orpingtons bred and exhibited by any club member in the county. I limit my prize to the one breed this year at the request of the County Demonstrator, as he expects to have a similar prize for other breeds.

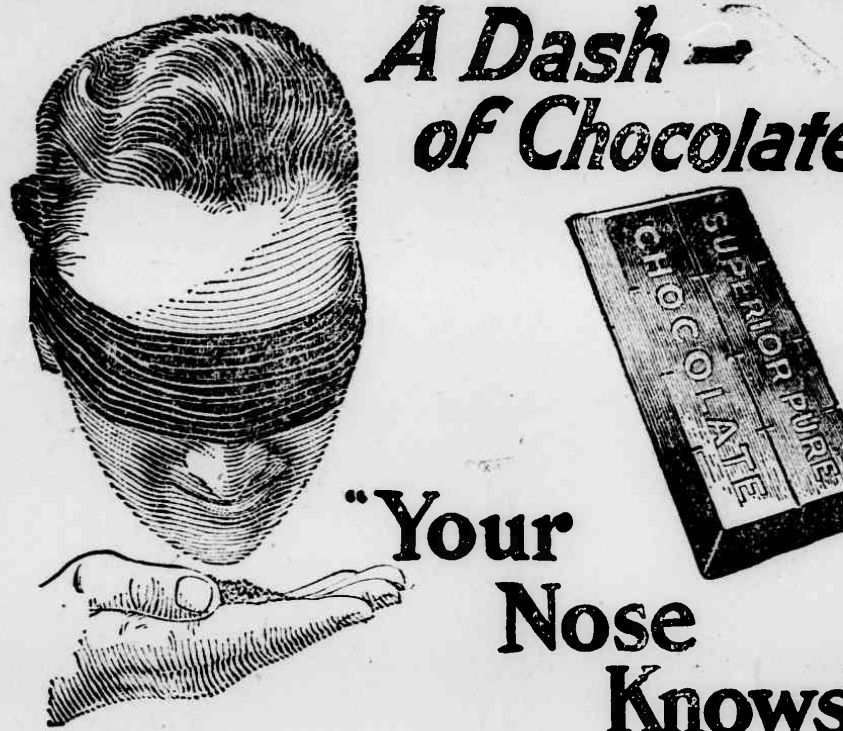

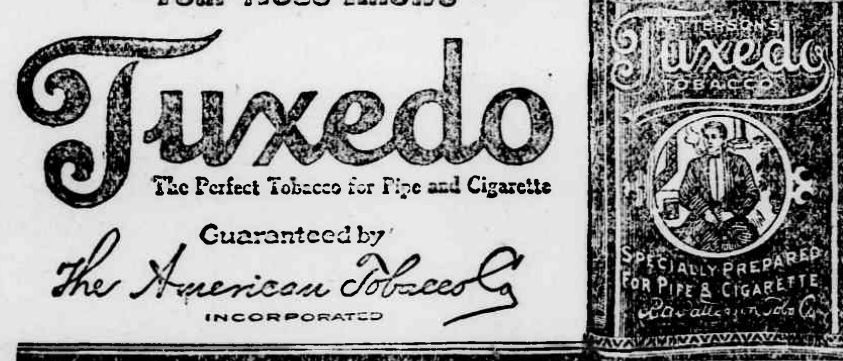
