THE TREATY IS DEAD

The Treaty of Versailles, to which was appended the Covenant of the League of Nations, has gone to the scrap heap, so far as the present recalcitrant Senate is concerned and may become an issue in the 1920 campaign. The final vote followed the defeat of the Lodge reservations to the League and three unsuccessful attempts to ratify during the closing hours of the special session. After all reservations proposed had been defeated a resolution "free of all encumbrances" met the fate of others. The Senators went home without doing anything with the treaty at all and a state of war with Germany is still in effect.

After adjournment, majority leader Lodge, admitted that "the treaty is dead so far as this senate is concerned. The President may withdraw it when the Senate reconvenes, and, of course, he can then re-submit it in the next session, but the treaty is dead in this senate and they killed it, as I told them they would, if they voted against it."

Which reminds us of the story of the late Congressman Crawford used in flaying republican hypocrisy in the treatment of issues bearing upon unfavorable business while that party happened to be in charge of the affairs of the country. "If the times are hard when we are in power," suggested Mr. Crawford, "the republicans say, 'the democrats done it,' but if things go wrong while the republicans are in power, they, with one accord, declare 'the Lord done it.'" Maybe it was the Lord who defeated the treaty, Mr. Lodge. No intelligent man is going to take seriously the charge that it was defeated by the democrats. The blame may be laid at the door of the minority, but it will not stick. The murderers are none other than Senator Lodge and men of his stripe.

The President may withdraw the treaty and present it again in the next session, and he may not. One thing is certain: The republicans will not be permitted to render it meaningless with so-called reservations to satisfy the whims of pea-nut politicians. And Mr. Lodge knows that by this time.

JUST FOR A DAY

The North Carolina Orphan Association again calls upon every man, woman and child in the State to contribute on or near Thanksgiving Day at least one day's income to the orphanage of his or her choice.

In order that more adequate equipment and support may be provided for the twenty child-caring institutions in the State the One-Day-For-The-Orphans Movement was started some years ago calling upon the people to add to the stream of regular contributions a special Thanksgiving offering equal to one day's income.

This is a reasonable request, for anyone can share with the orphans the earnings of one day out of three hundred and sixty-five. It is practicable, for rich and poor alike can participate in it. It enlists the people of all creeds and classes in beautiful co-operation for the support of a needy civic and Christian philanthropy. While it deposits a handsome aggregate in the orphanage treasuries, it also deepens and enriches the life of all classes and conditions of our citizenship.

The movement is a prime invest-

ment for both Church and State, first saving from degeneracy the most exposed children in the world, and then training them for usefulness in both the Commonwealth and the Kingdom.

Who of us in the joyous Thanksgiving season can refuse to contribute the amount of one day's income, or the wages of a day to assist in taking the little feet of children of poverty and neglect from the high road of ruin and place them upon a path leading to other things—to high attainment—perhaps to complete happiness and lives of usefulness?

"Even so, it is not the will of your father which is in heaven that one of these little ones shall perish," said the Master. If you have not already sent a contribution to one of the 20 orphanages in the State, "think on these things."
