TRANSYLVANIA BOY MAKES GOOD IN NAVY

Daniell M. Reid, Navy Mail Clerk on the U. S. S. Melville, enlisted in the Navy on October 10th, 1916. Reid enlisted in the navy to see the world, and at the same time intended to take advantage of one of the many opportunities the Navy offers a young man to fit himself for some trade or vocation in civil life. He has had furloughs in the two largest cities in the world, and many of the smaller ones in both hemispheres. He was for over twenty months despatcher of mails for 44 U. S. Ships and stations, six of which were naval seaplane stations, with Base Six at Queenstown, Ireland, as headquarters.

Since the close of the war he has maintained and kept up operation on board the U. S. S. Melville, a Branch Post Office of New York, and has done a money order business nearly equal to the average done by the New York Branch offices located in the City of New York; this, however, is accounted for by the fact that the Melville is a Destroyer Tender, mothering from 17 to 25 destroyers.

As a summary, we might say that since October 10, 1916, Reid has seen many queer, wonderful, and beautiful things that only a millionaire could have seen in civilian life; and in the meantime he has received a practical business education, including a standard system of bookkeeping, touch system of typewriting, and a thorough knowledge of the use of various make of calculating machines.

He is now on the Melville with the New Pacific Fleet, which has recently

completed a cruise from Boston, Mass. to San Diego, Cal., by way of the Panama Canal, and expects to spend the winter in San Diego in southern "sunny California."
