JONES GAP ROAD TO BE IMPROVED

The following article from the Daily Greenville Piedmont of Dec. 5 will be of much interest to the people of Brevard and Transylvania coun

"The Jones Gap road, the main thorofare thru the mountains in the vicinity of Caesars Head and connect-Greenville with Brevard and Transylvania county, will be surveyed within the next two weeks, according to a. statement by L. P. Slattery of the firm of Slattery & Henry. The state highway engineer has ordered the sur vey which will be in charge of R. H. Horton of this city.

"The old Jones Gap road likely will be relocated in order to elimate many the steep grades which now exist. When this is done the road will be on a par with the Buncombe road which connects Greenville with Hendersonville and Asheville. The work of surveying the road will begin about Dec. 15th and when completed a report will be forwarded to the state highway engineer. It is considered likely that the work of re-locating and repairing the road will begin, altho it is not thought that the highway can be completed in time for the tourist travel next summer."
