

PREPARING A DAIRY ANIMAL FOR SHOW

There are many reasons why good live stock should be exhibited at local and state fairs. A first class representation of a breed is an important factor in promoting breed interests. Many a man who is undecided as to the breed of live stock that he will select has been influenced in making his decision by representatives of a breed that he has seen exhibited at a fair.

The individual breeder secures a great deal of advertising as the result of exhibiting good live stock, because it gives people a chance to see and know the kind of cattle that a man is breeding and paves the way for future business. An instance typical of many others is cited of a farmer who kept a breed dairy cattle that were not popular in his neighborhood, and as a result, sales were slow. A friend advised him to prepare and exhibit part of the herd at several county fairs. This was done, and as a result, the premium money taken in paid most of the expenses and the sales kept up more rapidly the next few months. Just feel the undertaking is a great investment one.

It is now well known why special thought and attention must be given to the care and handling of cattle intended for exhibition. First, it is important to remember that the odd-looking animals to the average public is poor advertising, especially when it is disadvantageous to the exhibitor to have them. Second, it is important to keep the animals clean, neat and well groomed, and to make the hide smooth and flexible. Every hair must be clean, and the hair should be as short as possible. By this is meant that when it stands its feet are properly placed, back straight and head alert. Any movement on the part of the attendant or animal should be as graceful as possible. Until the ribbons are placed, take no chances.

preparation of a dairy animal for show is that of training to lead and stand properly. An untrained animal cannot display its good points to advantage if it combats the efforts of the attendant to exhibit it properly. A little time spent daily in training to handle properly will save effort and embarrassment later and increases the financial returns.

The exhibitor of an animal while in the judging ring should have one main thought in mind, namely, that of showing the animal to the best possible advantage. By this is meant that when it stands its feet are properly placed, back straight and head alert. Any movement on the part of the attendant or animal should be as graceful as possible. Until the ribbons are placed, take no chances.

And I will sell the land so described in the manner and upon the conditions and subject to the restrictions and covenants set forth in the Deed of Trust.


