## **FARM NEWS**

C. C. Yongue and Ed. McCoy have definitely decided to have their flock of hens bood tested for white diarrhea. Others are figuring on the same. Will give an added value to the eggs or baby chickens. Will sell first. Can raise a greater perecent of chicks from such flocks.

Our corn crop looks to be from one-third to one-half better than Madison County's.

Mr. Jack Ashworth brings in a Porterician sweet potato, that weighs four and one-half pounds, and expects to find some larger.

To keep sweet potatoes, first you must dry them out by sweating in pile and then sunning, or by heat at PLAY CHRIST SCHOOL TEAM 85 degrees for two weeks, or by putting a bushel to bag and hang in warm dry place till dry. After dry hole in ground on board floor, and cover six inches wih dry sraw, and Thursday, by clearly outplaying the two feet of dirt.

Hens not laying before cold weather will hardly begin before January. About time to put all in the house and keep their noses to the mash hopper, to bring them into laying soon. A good Fall lay is impossible without keeping in house sides. till fuo ro'clock each day. In housing you must see that the green is furnished, and straw to make them exercise.

The mash should be twenty percent animal meat or fish meal, and the scratch feed a general mixture Feed from ten to twelve pounds of are under a first-class coach. scratch per hundred hens per day. Ten for rushing into laying, then let up and feed about the same of scratch as they eat of mash.

Now is the time to put in rye and wheat to have the least cheat.

A letter from the Mixson Seed company doesn't give us much hope of selling rye unless the price of cotton picks up. Farmers consider cover crops luxuries, and leave them off in tight places. Leave a little hope for November. Price is low
