Tom Tarheel says he didn't mind paying for that box at the supper last week when he found the girls were going to send a delegate to the club short course

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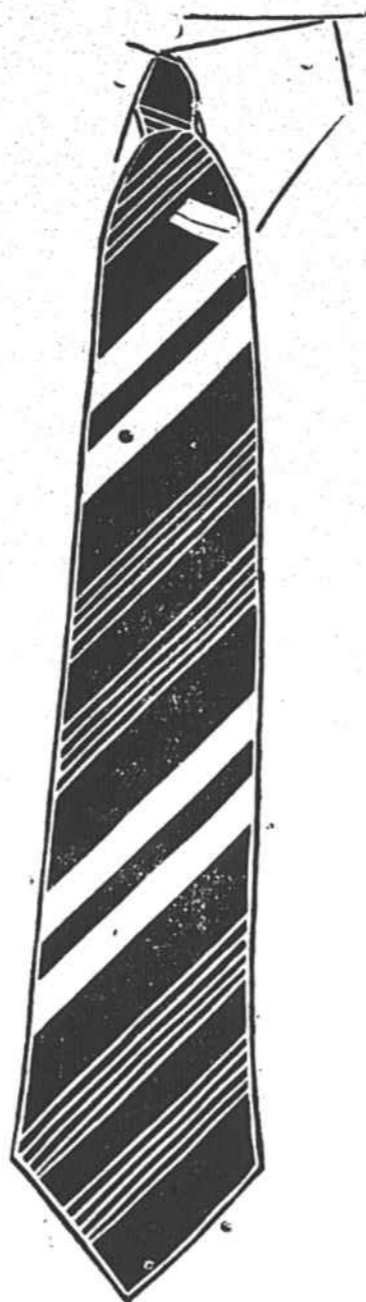
