SILVERSTEEN IS PRAISED IN TIMES

FOLKS WORTH WHILE IN WNC (Asheville Times, Sunday, July 22) A youth of 23, who came to western North Carolina from Pennsylvania a little over 25 years ago, today is Transylvania county's largest taxpayer, as well as one of its most useful and active citizens.

He is Joseph S. Silversteen, president of the Toxaway Tanning company, president of the Gloucester Lumber company, president of the Rosman Tanning Extract company, president of the Transylvania Tanning company vice president and chairman of the board of the Brevard Country club, and president of the western North Carolina Timber and Lumber association.

Mr. Silversteen was born in Towanda, Pennsylvania, 49 years ago, and came to Brevard in 1902. At that time Brevard had a population of 250, and Rosman, 10 miles from here and now known as "Silversteen's town," did not exist. The total assessed valuation of property in the county was then less than one million dollars.

In 1902 Mr. Silversteen organized the Toxaway Tanning company, which is still in operation and is one of the big concerns of the county. In 1910 he had charge of the Hans Rees tannery in Asheville. Then in 1911 he purchased 20,000 acres of land from George W. Vanderbilt, lying in Gloucester township, and organized the Gloucester Lumber company. The Rosman Tanning Extract company was organized in 1913 and three years later the Transylvania Tanning company was formed and began business.

Each of these concerns is a big one, and Mr. Silversteen personally directs them all. The assessed valuation in the county is now \$12,000,000, and much of this increase is on the holding of the various companies operated by Mr. Silversteen. Hundreds of men are on the payrolls of the companies headed by him and every day in the year the Southern Railway company hauls many carloads of the products out of the county, to the markets of the nation, bringing outside money into the county.

In addition to his heavy business duties, Mr. Silversteen takes an active interest in all community work, being a member of the board of directors of the Brevard Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the boys' work committee of the Brevard Kiwanis club.

While he lives in Brevard, where one of his biggest concerns is located, and where he owns considerable property, his greatest personal concern is for the town of Rosman. It is "his" town, in that his many manufacturing plants there caused the town to grow up where there had been only a farm and forest. Rosman people are real folks, having erected many splendid homes in the town, with up-to-date business houses, churches and fine schools, and it is not a company-owned town, but is called "Silversteen's town" because of the fact that it was due to the industries which he established there that the town came into existence.

The Silversteen family lives in Brevard, in the town's most palatial home, standing in the center of a large estate. "Silvermont," Mrs. Silversteen is prominent in North Carolina society and is recognized as one of the most active club women in western Carolina. The Misses Silversteen are popular members of the younger society circles, in the region.
