

BREVARD TEAMS WIN IN ROSMAN GAMES

By a score of 17 to 14 the Brevard High School Blue Devil basketball team, in their second game of the season defeated the Rosman five last Friday evening. The game was played in the Rosman gymnasium before a crowd that packed the room almost to the point of suffocation.

The Blue Devil quintet took the lead in the first quarter, but were soon overtaken by inspired rivals. The Rosman team fought gamely and three times passed the score of the Blue Devils. Victory was almost entirely due to superior guarding and teamwork. Whitmire and Eldridge, center and forward respectively took advantage of the few breaks and were high scorers for Rosman.

The Rosman quint was leading in the third quarter, but the speedy, flashes of teamwork of Brevard and the excellent shooting of Paul and Joe Schachner and McCall enabled them to nose Rosman out in the fourth.
