BOND ORDER

Be It Resolved, by the Board of Commissioners for the County of Transylvania, State of North Carolina:

(a) That negotiable coupon bonds of said county registerable as to principal, shall be issued under authority of County Finance Act and other statutes applicable, for the special purpose of funding valid indebtedness incurred for the Constitutional school term and necessary expenses.

(b) That the maximum aggregate principal amount of said bonds shall be \$335,000.

(c) That a tax sufficient to pay principal and interest of said bonds as same fall due, shall be annually levied and collected.

(d) That a statement of debt of said county has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection and the County Auditor is hereby designated as the proper official to file said statement.

(e) That this Order shall take effect on its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

(f) That it is hereby found as a fact and determined and declared that this Board is properly and legally constituted and organized and has the power and authority to issue said bonds; that said bonds are necessary and unavoidable for the special purpose stated and the proceeds shall be applied to said purpose and to no other.

(g) That this Board will meet in the courthouse in said County at 2 P. M., June 1, 1931, for the purpose of hearing any protest against issuance of said bonds, the Board reserving the right on final passage of this order to amend same except as to maximum amount of bonds that may be issued. The foregoing Order was finally passed on the first day of June, 1931, and was first published on the fourth day of June, 1931. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said Order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

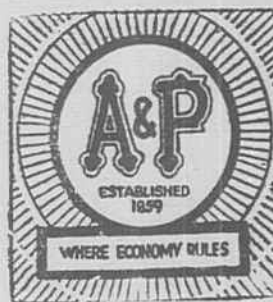
