The North Carolina Automobile Law and What You Must Know About It THE LAW The financial Responsibility Law pertaining to the operation of Motor Vehicles in the State of North Carolina, effective July 1, 1931, compels the Commissioner of Revenue to revoke the license and registration of a person, when a judgment in excess of \$100 has been rendered against such person, arising out of the use of a motor vehicle, where such judgment remains unpaid after 30 days, unless such person shall furnish proof of his ability to respond in damages for future accidents.

Penalties If any person fails to return operator's license and registration certificates after failure to prove financial security he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of not less than \$100, nor more than \$1000. If any person shall forge any evidence of financial security he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine of not less than \$100 or not more than \$1000, or not more than 30 days in jail, or both.

Forms of Responsibility Required Financial responsibility may be established in the following manner: A certificate of insurance issued by an insurance company licensed to do business in the State, certifying that the owner carries public liability insurance of not less than \$5000 for one injured person and not less than \$10,000 for two or more persons injured in any one accident, and property damage insurance of not less than \$1000 for damage to property.
