**STATE REVENUE FALLS OFF \$2,000,00 IN YEAR**

Total general fund revenue collections for the fiscal year ending July 1, 1930, amounted to \$12,927,749.97, or \$2,416,492.38 less than the \$15,344,242.35 collected the year before, the report of A. J. Maxwell, Commissioner of Revenue, shows.

The gasoline tax, license and title registration fees amounted to \$18,714,864.69, or \$1,204,067.14 less than the \$19,918,931.83 collected the year before.

Estimates of the deficit in operation of the State government for the past two years range from \$1,700,000 to \$2,000,000. The report will be out soon.

Mr. Maxwell has authorized collection of the Schedule B. license taxes in July without penalty, due to the delay in getting out notice to taxpayers because of the long session of the General Assembly. The penalty of five per cent a month will not apply to July, but it will be 10 per cent August 1.
