DIVERSIFIED CROPS MAKE THE FARM PAY

RALEIGH, Sept. 2.—On the river bottom place of the Casey Brothers, near Dudley in Wayne County, there used to be a population of 56 persons, mostly tenants and their families. Now there are only 21 persons on the place but as much land is cultivated, and more profitably, than formerly was the case there.

"When all our tenants fell behind one year—largely because a flood drowned out much of the cotton—we decided we had better grow only those crops that give us a double chance of a harvest," says Ed Casey, the eldest of the two brothers who built up the farm from small beginnings.

In recent years they have produced small grains, beans and corn only and have made a go of the new system. They expect to make livestock, both cattle and hogs, a major feature of their operations.
