Plans are being made for the annual Home-Coming day at the Davidson River Presbyterian church. The affair will be observed Sunday, October 4th.

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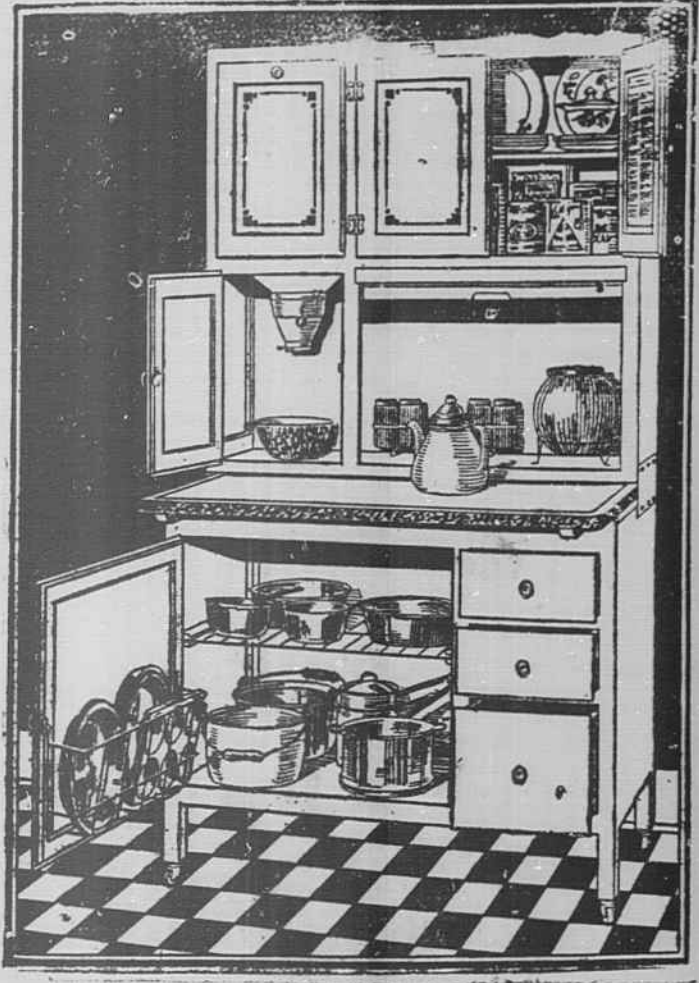
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
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
