## SCOUT IS HELPFUL TO THOSE IN NEED

There are numerous ways in which the Boy Scout may fulfill the third law which says that "A Scout is helpful. He must be prepared at any time to save life, help injured persons, and share the home duties. He must do at least one "Good Turn to somebody every day."

Helpfulness is an important item in the Scout's daily life, for it was by an incident in which a Scout was doing his daily good turn that the Boy Scout organization was started in America.

William D. Boyce, Chicago publisher and traveler was seeking a difficult address in old London. A young lad approached him and asked: "May I be of service to you?" Mr. Boyce told him the address he was seeking and the boy said, "Come with me sir," and immediately led him to the desired spot. As was the wont of the American tourist, Mr. Boyce offered the boy a tip for his services, but the boy refused saying, "No sir, I am a Scout. Scouts do not accept tips for courtesies."

Mr. Boyce at once became interested in the organization and went with the boy to Scout headquarters where he met Sir Robert Baden-Powell, founder of the British Boy Scout Association and he received information sufficient to start an organization elsewhere and brought it to the United States. "On February 8th of the next year, Mr. Boyce and others interested in boys and citizenship formally incorporated The Boy Scouts of America. This day is observed each year as the birthday of Scouting in the United States."

And thus an unknown British Scout in doing his daily good turn, created a movement in America that is now the largest organization for boys in the world.

You never know when a good turn is going to repay you or someone else in far better manner than the original good turn.

Millions of good turns are done every day, by men and women, boys and girls in all the walks of life. They may be small acts of kindness or they may be the vital deeds. Such good turns range from carrying packages for burdened persons to saving human lives.

The Boy Scout is trained to live up strictly to his motto which is "Do a Good Turn Daily." Unpleasant chores and duties in home work and daily life are cheerfully and skilfully carried out by the good Scout.

The Boy Scout organization is based upon the principles of knight-hood, and helpfulness was one of the Knight's special features. The knight mounted on a faithful steed and encased in flashing armour went out into the world doing good in many ways. The Boy Scout goes out in uniform with a first aid kit at his side, prepared to help anyone in need and to do it skilfully and cheerfully.
