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ROSMAN SCHOOL NEWS

THE WIDE-AWAKE TEACHER IS USING NATURE

The teacher is in school to bring more life to the children. She defines their environment, and brings them into an educational situation in such a way that the result is education. Child participation is the most significant factor in learning. Reading is an extension of experience. Books do not tell us anything unless we have a background, such as is gained by actual experience.

An intelligent use of material around us is a sign of the live minded and forward looking teacher. Science has been neglected in the lower grades but is now coming into its own in modern school practice. It is refreshing to see a school room where the pupils' environment is enriched by nature materials and knowledge is gained in the presence of objects themselves, rather than pictures and verbal description alone. Teachers ought to know how to interpret nature materials.

If a pupil brings in a leaf or live animal there is an opportunity to give home a bit of knowledge and if the teacher cannot interpret the material the opportunity is lost.

The practical suggestion made here is for the teacher to constantly improve her own knowledge of natural objects and bring us much nature material as possible into the school room to enrich the environment of the pupils and stimulate their natural powers of observation. It is especially desirable that some of the nature material be the actual property of the children and kept in the school room long enough to become an integral part of it.
