OLD BRIDGE GIVES WAY TO PROGRESS

The old County bridge which has stood over the river at D. L. Glazener's store, for many years, has given way to the new and more modern structure, the State Highway bridge, which spans the French Broad river at the site of the present Rosman jail. The old bridge has served the public since 1916, when the bridge occupying that place was taken out by the flood. This bridge had been in use for many years.

The present site was first used for a float bridge, there being no wagon bridge then, the river being forded by teams. Later, when the automobile came, a wagon bridge displaced the foot bridge. The new steel bridge was built in 1928 and 29. After that the old bridge received no more repairs. It was then condemned. Last week, when it was torn down, marked the passing of an old landmark.
