From the Files of Long Ago

MAKING IT UP

There seems one thought which, somehow or other, we all have on December 25th. It is a good old English Custom (because it is a good old Christian custom) to make up quarrels, to set things straight, to smooth out roughness at Christmas time. To make our Christmas Communion with a quarrel not made up is as little to be thought of as not to make it at all. We cannot stay away. We cannot go as we are. Remedies are within reach. It is for each of us to use the remedy the church offers to meet the case. However absurd it may seem to make a "season" the reason for making up a quarrel, it is more absurd still to let it pass without so doing.

"Peace on earth" is one of the meanings of the day. The thought is very beautifully embodied in a Christmas poem by and English clergyman. The opening and closing verses are especially suggestive:

When man and spouse estranged have been,
A little child has come between.
The man beholds his image there,
The mother owns the mother's care,
And both are one
In that dear son.

When God and man estranged have been,
The little child hath come between:
Both Son of God and Son of Man,
Ordained by love's divinest plan.
So peace is made
And love displayed.

Then joy we have the Holy Child,
Our hearts to God hath reconciled.
So friend be reconciled to friend
In Christmas greetings, quarrels end,
Contentions cease
-And all be peace.

A merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, so at least we may know something of that heart felt gaiety that deep inner merriment wrapt up in the old English Christmas greeting, "A merry Christmas and a Happy New Year".

So we keep the olden greeting
With its meaning deep and true,
And wish a merry Christmas
And a Happy New Year to you.

A PRAYER FOR MAKING IT UP.
O Lord God, merciful and gracious, who hath not dealt with us after our sins, nor rewarded us according to our iniquities, help us to be forbear-

ing to one another, and forgiving one another freely. As Christ freely gave us, so we must forgive one another, especially at Christmas time, a time above all to make up quarrels, set things straight and smooth out roughness.

So shall "Peace on earth," one of the blessed meanings of that day be ours indeed and in truth. And we shall joy that the Holy Child our hearts to God hath reconciled. So shall friend be reconciled to friend, and Christmas greetings, quarrels end, contentions shall cease and all be peace.

Grant that this may be the prayer and wish of one and all, our Father, "May the peace of the starlit night, the joy of the angelic throng, the eager hope of the hastening shepherds, the light of dawning day, the tender love of the virgin Mother, the adoration of the wise men, possess our hearts." May we, by bestowing rather than receiving, forgetting wrongs, remembering kindness, healing wounds, lifting burdens, cheering the cheerless, loving the loveless, cause the world to hear again the melody of the divine song that broke upon the Judean hills the first Christmas eve: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace, good will to men." And the praise and the glory shall be holy Thine, Father, Son and spirit, now and ever, Amen.
