GOV. GARDNER PAYS VISIT TO NEGRO IN DEATH ROW

Raleigh, Jan. 20.—Gov. Gardner made one of his extremely rare visits to "death row" at State Prison last week to talk with Ernest Herring, 22-year-old negro of Sampson county, twice convicted of the murder, along with his brother, Chevies Herring, of E. F. Newton, aged Kerr postmaster. Chevies twice swore his brother Ernest was guilty of the murder, but while he sat in the electric chair on December 15, just before paying the death penalty himself, he said Ernest was innocent. Ernest was to have been electrocuted last Friday, but Governor Gardner, who previously had declined to interfere with the sentence, issued a stay of execution for 60 days, in order to investigate further.
