THE PRAYER CORNER

(From the Files of Long Ago)

THE CHRISTIAN HOME

Read Ephesians 6:1-9.

This is called the Family Chapter. The gospel should be all powerful in the home. Horace Bushnell thought that the need of the world is the out-populating power of a Godly stock.

When Christ becomes Master of the home, it becomes possible to bless the world with a Godly stock. Blessed are those homes where every member loves and obeys Christ.

The following is a good motto to hang in the home:

"Christ is the Head of this home, The Unseen Guest at every meal, The Silent Listener to every conversation."

There is no other place where Christ like qualities shine so brightly. Obedience, Love, Reverence, Patience, Forbearance, such as these are the household virtues. Let us invite Christ to come into our own homes, that He may teach us these things.

The homes should be the place of Christian Nurture. No other place can do the work of home. The father is the rightful head of the home and he should prepare himself to be the priest of his own altar. It should be his care, the mother working with him to bring every member of the household, servants (if there are any), as well as children, under the influence of the chastening and admonition of the Lord.

The few families now-a-days have any real plan of Christian Nurture. The spiritual training of children is left to haphazard. The Bible is too frequently crowded out and the prayer is not observed. No wonder then that children slip away into the great world and forget Christ and the

Church. It is estimated that 60 per cent of the boys of the Church pass out and are lost in the careless world. What of the responsibility of the home? The home has the first and best opportunity to leave indelible marks on the Kingdom of the heart of the child. The Christian home is the greatest single force for the upbuilding of the Kingdom.

In reading the passage above, Eph. 6:1-9 notice the repeated phrases "In the Lord," "Into Christ," "to the Lord." This is the secret of the Christian home, in touch with the Mastery of Christ.

Jesus evidently conceived our family relationships as preeminently important. And we can understand why, can we not? When we remember that all the terms in which the Christian religion is expressed are family terms. Father, Son, Brethren. Whatever therefore tends to inure the purity and beauty of the home tends to lower the meaning of the home terms of fatherhood and brotherhood, and that tends to make it impossible truly to think of God in a high way as our brethren.

Had there never been a pure home life, Jesus never would have used home terms to describe God and his fellow men.

There is a sense then in which Christianity depends on the home. What a fine comment it is on Joseph and Mary in their Nazareth home, that Jesus should best describe God as Father and call his Disciples His Family.

PRAYER FOR THE CHRISTIAN HOME

O Blessed Jesus, Who, for thirty years didst dwell in Thy humble home at Nazareth, be with Thy servants in their homes. Keep from them all pride and selfishness, and impurity, that they may be dwelling places met for Thy sacred Presence. Grant Thy servants to Grow in grace and knowledge and love of Thee. Guide them throughout their life on earth, comfort them in all weakness and bring them at last to Thy House in Heaven.

O Father, grant Thy Benediction on the homes of Thy servants that there they may so truly learn what the great home terms mean that they may be able to call Thee their Father, and all men their brethren in sincerity and truth.

Give them grace that they may lead their children to know and love Thee. Keep them from fretfulness and impatience. Help them to make their home a place of sunshine, because Thou art there. Grant them Thy Wisdom that they may know how to direct the steps of their children. Let Thine angels be their constant, tho' unseen guardians, and bring them all, reunited families, to Thy home above, for Jesus Sake, Amen.
