Twenty-two young men were enlisted through the U. S. Navy Recruiting Headquarters at Raleigh during the week ending February 7th. These men represent the allowed quota for this district for the month of February 1932. In addition to meeting the rigid physical requirements, the following young Tar Heels attained a satisfactory grade on the General Classification Test and are named in the order of marks achieved: William Harold Bowman of Greensboro; Thomas Edward Johnston of Conover; Raymond Lee Souther of Fletcher; George Washington Bolt of Winston-Salem; John Lewis Bryson of Horse Shoe; Broadus Hammond of Charlotte; Willard Strickland of Smithfield; Walter Jackson Killough of Charlotte; Thomas Lee Needham of Ether; Henry Jones Eller of Salisbury; Roy Lawrence Truitt of Traphill; Herbert Volta Stafford of Spencer; Burke Battle Barbee of Richlands; and Elbert Lee Brown of Statesville. They were transferred immediately to the U. S. Naval Training Station, Hampton Roads, Virginia, where they are receiving initial instructions in the duties and life of sailors in the United States Navy.
