"Cabbages or Dollars," which is the wiser course for a young man to choose? A get-rich-quick-at-any-cost career or a quiet life of modest independence honestly earned? Jack stays in the small town, rescues Arda Martin's restaurant from the brink of failure by buying interest in it, and makes it such a huge success and himself so popular that the town belle is soon claiming him as her own.
