while America among all nations on the face of the earth had remained true to her traditions.

The speaker scored the election law violations, declaring that conditions in the state had become so rotten that Democratic delegations from Buncombe county journeyed to Raleigh and demanded relief from existing conditions.

The committee on resolutions reported the following: "We, the Republicans of Transylvania County in convention assembled in Brevard on this the 9th day of April, 1932, do resolve:

"First: That our faith in and allegiance to the National Administration, under the wise and powerful leadership of Herbert Hoover are greatly strengthened by the splendid manner in which this Nation's affairs have been conducted during this world-wide era of business stagnation.

"Second: That we demand of the powers that be in North Carolina the right of franchise in its true sense, pointing to the fact that under the present election laws, embracing the Absentee Ballot law, there is no semblance of real franchise in this State, and continuation of practice prevailing in the past will most certainly result in great harm to the State.

"Third: That we endorse the Hon. Lewis P. Hamlin for appointment to the post of United States District Attorney in the Western District of North Carolina, and urge our State Executive Committee to make such recommendation to the Attorney General.

"Fourth: That we pledge ourselves citizens to show our resentment in every honorable manner of the unfair treatment accorded our National Committeeman, the Hon. Charles A. Jonas, by Senators Bailey and Morrison whose unwarranted and unjust attacks robbed Mr. Jonas of his rightful place as District Attorney.

"Fifth: That we endorse Hon. James F. Barrett for nomination on the republican ticket for Congress.

"Sixth: That we re-affirm our faith in the honor and integrity of Hon. J. H. Pickelsimer, Hon. C. R. McNeely, Hon. R. R. Fisher, our former county officials, and give expression to our faith that Right will prevail and that they, too, shall be cleared of all charges against them even as were Messrs. Talley, White and Owen cleared of all blame by the high court of North Carolina."
