FAMOUS HOSTELRY BURNED TO GROUND

High Hampton inn, famous hostelry in Cashiers Valley, 35 miles south of Sylva, was burned to the ground Thursday.

The property loss is estimated at \$75,000. The loss of the old Hampton cottage, built by General Wade Hampton, noted South Carolina leader in the War Between the States, and his brother, Christopher, as a summer retreat, cannot be calculated in dollars and cents. Many relics, connected with the career of General Hampton, were consumed by the flames.

Besides the main building, which had 35 rooms, was two stories high, and was a rustic wood construction. Five small buildings were destroyed. Insurance, amounting to around \$27,000, was carried.

The origin of the fire has not been fully determined, but it is believed to have started in the cooking stove flue in the Halstead cottage, about

Funeral services for Mrs. Sarah Malende Thrift, who died at her home in Shelby, Saturday April 10, were held at the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Thrift had been critically ill for the past few weeks with a contraction of double pneumonia.

She was born March 11, 1832 and died April 20, 1932. She was ninety years, one month and nineteen days old. She was twice married; first to Mr. Lambert Nell, to which happy union was born one daughter, Mrs. Sid McCox of Hendersonville. Her second marriage was to the late P. M. Thrift, who preceded her to the grave by 24 years. To this union were born 11 children, eight of which survive. Five girls and 3 boys. Mrs. P. M. 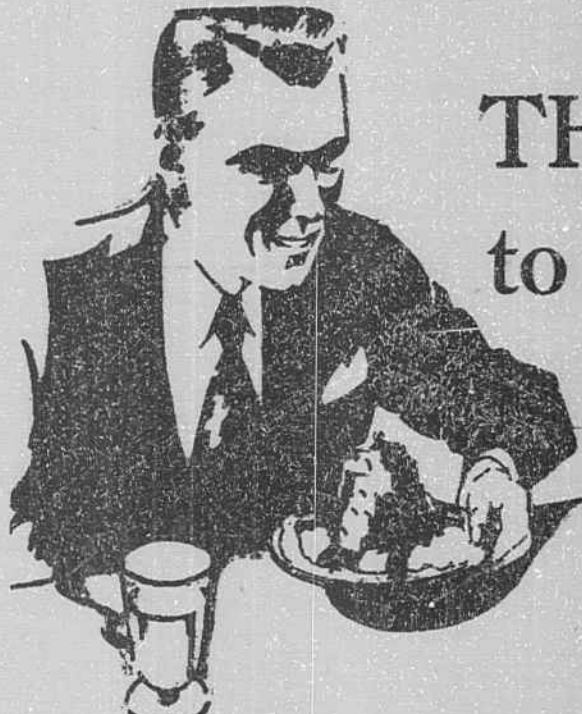
Rev. S. B. McCall held a little prayer service, then a delicious dinner was served under the shade of the trees. A number of children and grandchildren were absent.

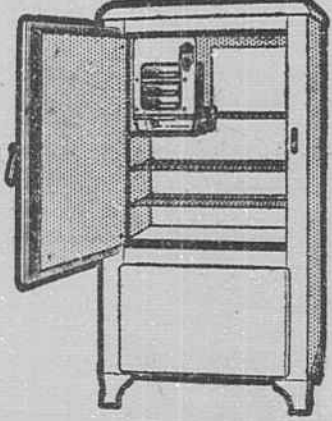

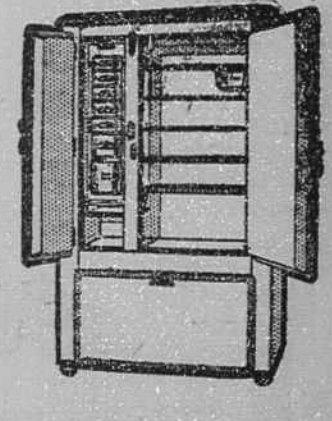
