According to Mrs. Smathers an entrance fee of 50 cents will be charged for each player, this entitling the holder to play each evening according to the progression of the tournament. A consolation match for the benefit of first night losers will be held Tuesday evening in addition to the regular games. A spectators fee of 15 cents will be charged to all who wish to watch the games.

The playing will begin at 8 o'clock and all players are urged to bring their cards and a partner. All who expect to enter the tournament are urged to notify Mrs. S. M. Macfie or Mrs. Paul Smathers in advance in order to facilitate the arrangements for playing.

The schedule and qualification requirements follow:

Schedule

First night:

Qualifying Rounds

1. All entrants report.

2. Pairing.

3. Play. After a series of 24 hands in which there is to be a progression between the winners in each squad. (Two tables or 4 teams) after every 8 hands, the 16 teams (32 entrants) having the highest score will be eligible for the opening rounds of the Championship flight. The losers will be paired together in a consolation flight.

Second night:

Eliminating Rounds

1. The qualifying teams (16) from the previous receiving report to Championship Flight. Those who failed to qualify will report to Consolation Flight.

Opening Rounds For Both Champ. and Con. Flights

(The following plan will determine the procedure for the Champ. Flight. The Con. Flight will be carried on in a somewhat like manner, depending on the No. of entrants. After the pairing, 16 hands will be played at each table, no progression at all, the winning team qualifying for the quarter finals. The losing team being eliminated from the tournament.

3. Quarter Finals. After 16 hands, which are to be played as in the opening rounds 4 teams will be eliminated and 4 teams will progress to the semi final rounds.

Third night:

Championship Rounds

1. Semi Finals. After 16 hands 2 teams survive.

2. Finals. After 16 hands the Champions Survive.
