

### MRS. J. A. MARSHALL PASSES ON MAY 22

Mrs. J. A. Marshall died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. L. Miller, on South Caldwell street in Brevard, on Sunday, May 22nd, after an illness that lasted for several weeks.

Mrs. Marshall was the wife of Rev. J. A. Marshall, who preceded her in death some 14 years ago. He was a Baptist minister in this and Jackson counties for more than fifty years before his death. He came to Western North Carolina from Quebec, Canada, just after the close of the Civil War, and made this section his home afterward. He was known far and wide as a preacher and teacher.

Mrs. Marshall was, before her marriage, Miss Sarah Josephine Wilson, of Greenville, N. C.; daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thompson Wilson, who were among the most prominent families of this section of Western North Carolina.

Mrs. Marshall is survived by two daughters and one son: Mrs. L. T. Cantrell, East Flat Rock, N. C.; Mrs. E. L. Miller, Brevard, N. C.; and Mr. E. A. Marshall, of Miami, Fla.; and one brother, Mr. Henry Wilson of Greenville, N. C.

Mrs. Marshall's funeral was conducted at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. L. Miller, in Brevard, by Rev. Mr. Hartsell of the Baptist church and Rev. Mr. West of the Methodist church. The Brevard Undertakers were in charge of the arrangements, and Messrs. H. M. Miller, Glover Jackson, Marion Galloway, E. F. Moffitt, Hobart Allison, and Ernest Aiken, were pall bearers. Interment was at the Freeman cemetery near Fruitland, N. C. The floral offerings were profuse and very beautiful.

### GRADUATES JOIN UNEMPLOYED RANKS

Raleigh, June 8.—Commencement exercises at colleges in North Carolina have been in full swing during the past week or 10 days and practically all of them will be completed during this week. It is a sad commentary and a deplorable prediction that many, probably most, of the approximately 1,800 receiving diplomas during this 10-day period may find it necessary to join the ranks of the unemployed for weeks to come.

### BIBLICAL PEST IS DUE TO RETURN

Raleigh, June 8.—Entomologists, sometimes called bug-ologists, are awaiting impatiently for the heralded 17-year locust, officially known as the cicada, and are wondering if this bug, a Biblical pest, is going to disappoint them and fail to appear, as it did 17 years ago. Forty counties, largely in the piedmont and west, have been visited by this locust in the past and entomologists are having them watched carefully to see if it appears as scheduled. If it does not appear in the droves that have come in the past, the entomologists will investigate to see why it has disappeared, or if it has completely disappeared, and may find some modern cause, maybe gasoline fumes or electric lights, as the reason.

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
