Rev. F. H. Holden preached at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Moody Sunday.

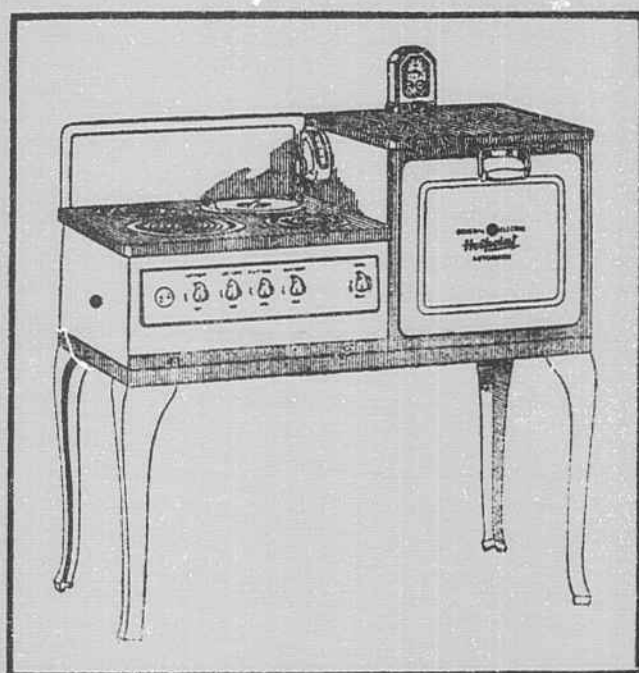
STAMP IS ISSUED TO HONOR MORTON

Raleigh, June 15.—Five thousand "Arbor Day" stamps are being used by the Department of Conservation and Development, commemorating the 100th anniversary of the birth of J. Sterling Morton, whose efforts in 1872 were responsible for setting aside the first Arbor Day in Nebraska, North Carolina's "Arbor Day" the past spring was widely observed, especially by school children throughout the State by planting trees in connection with the George Washington Bicentennial event. More than 100 miniature forests have been set on public school grounds in the State and this movement is expected to have great educational value in the movement toward reforestation in North Carolina.
