## **IOLD TOXAWAY NEWS PENROSE WINNER** MAY BE FIGHT OVER THE CHAIRMANSHIP

Raleigh, July 14.-When the State Democratic Executive Committee meets in Raleigh the latter part of this month, at call of Chairman O. M. Mull, one of its most important tasks will be to select a State Chairman to take active charge of the campaign this fall and guide the destinies of the party for the next two years. Chairman Mull, holding this post for four years, has indicated that he will not stand for re-election.

The committee of 132 members will do the slecting, but will listen to the principal candidates, for Governor and U. S. Senator. J. C. B. Ehringhaus and Robert R. Reynolds, these candidates, have conferred together and with Governor O. Max Gardner, titular head of the party, and it is believed that a leader suitable to all factions will be selected.

Major L. P. McLendon, Ehringhaus manager, and C. L. Shuping, Bailey manager two years ago, have been mentioned, as has Thomas C. (Tam) Bowie, defeated in the first primary as candidate for the Senate. Objections have been made to all of them. Reynolds has indicated that Walter Woodson, Salisbury, is acceptable H. to him. Governor-Nominee Ehringhaus has made no indication of his preference. J. Wallace Winborne, Marion, might be a compromise. He is said to be on proper terms with Ehringhaus and Reynolds, Governor Gardner and Senator Bailey. Others will be suggested. Harmony is expected.


