# LATE FALL GARDEN POSSIBLE FOR ALL

Carefully preparing the soil and using partially shaded seed beds will permit the gardner to have a supply of vegetables for the late fall garden. "In starting plants which need to be transplanted, it is better to seed hem in partially shaded seed beds ather than attempt to plant in the pen field," recommends E. B. Morow, extension horticulturist at State College. "A lattice work of small slats makes an excellent covering for such a bed but if slats are not available, nine brush or other material may be used. However, this covering should placed high enough above the ground to permit free circulation of the air and to give room for watering and weeding. If the soil is dry when the seeding is made, water it thoroughly and then cover with old sacks to retain the moisture. Remove

the sacks as soon as the seedlings begin to push through the earth." Young plants grown in this way must be hardened, however, before they are exposed to the hot summer This may be done by gradually moving the shade.

In planting garden seeds directly n rows, get the seed down in the noist earth.
