IMPRESSIONS OF THE SYLVAN VALLEY FAIR

The fair would not have served its purpose along educational lines if no lasting impressions were secured. And much good has resulted this year for it has been brought to light that some of the ideas long held by the county are at variance with actual facts. For instance, judges in these contests do not give the highest rating to the largest specimens exhibited but judge them according to quality, purity and freedom from disease. It was especially mentioned by Prof. Glazener, in commenting on this fact, that in judging sweet potatoes the highest awards did not go to the huge jumbos but to the ones that were of a pure strain, of standard grades and free from disease. The same is true of all the exhibits and it is to be stressed that quantity production of purebred, disease-free products will be far more desirable than the production of the huge, unmarketable diseased products.

HOME ECONOMICS CLASS

The fine exhibits of the Home Economics class, of which Miss Virginia Wilcox is teacher attracted considerable attention. In this class the girls are taught that successful home making is both a science and an art and this lends something of an air of importance and dignity to their work. This was all evidenced in the care and skill with which their exhibits were prepared.
